Albert Cain was born Jan. 29, 1888 in Oconto, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Cain. He was a life long resident of Oconto and the vicinity.

In his youth he worked for Oconto Company for a number of years, and for about 30 years had operated taverns at various locations. One of them, the Swamp Saloon north of Oconto, was destroyed by fire 22 years ago. He and his wife [Florence] operated The Pines, one of the areas more elaborate taverns and eating places, for about eight years prior to his retirement. It has been leased to others a portion of the time the last 10 years, and they had rearranged it for their use as a home about two years ago.

He married the former Florence LaPierre in Wakegan, Ill., July 2, 1923. She survives him, together with one step-daughter, Mrs. George Johnson, Marinette; three brothers, William of Portland, Ore.; Harry, Waukesha, and Milton J. Cain, Oconto; two sisters, Mrs. Victor John Gillett, and Mrs. Frank Rousseau, Milwaukee, and six grandchildren.

He was a veteran of World War I and member of the Jones-Modrow post American Legion, also of Elks Lodge No. 887, Oconto.⁵⁸

James Cain Fatally Injured Last Night In Auto Accident

"Local Man died in Oconto Hospital After Being Struck by Car Driven by Green Bay Man on Smith Avenue

Oconto's first traffic fatality of 1946 occurred last night when James Cain, Gale street, died in the Oconto hospital after being struck on Smith avenue between McDonald and Gale streets as he was returning home for supper about 6:15 yesterday evening.

Cain sustained a fractured leg, and shoulder, numerous cuts and bruises, internal injuries and a possible skull fracture when struck by a car driven by Clarence J. Casper, Green Bay, who was traveling south on highway 41. He was immediately taken to the Oconto hospital in the Sheffield ambulance and died there at 10 o'clock without recovering consciousness.

Casper, who was an adjuster for the Western Insurance Adjustment Company, was returning from Marinette when the accident occurred. He said he had just passed under the light at McDonald street and was right
